Play Schemas

Play schemas are repeated patterns of behaviour that children use to explore and understand the world around them. These patterns, or schemas, are driven by a child's natural urge to investigate, experiment, and make sense of their environment.

Rotation: How things turn and twist

A child might be fascinated with circular motions or spinning.

Enveloping: Covering of hiding objects (or selves)

A child may like to cover or wrap themselves and/or objects.

Connecting: Joining together and taking apart

A child may like to join and fasten things together and then take them apart again.

Transporting: Moving items (or selves) from one space to another A child may focus on moving objects from one place to another and back again.

Orientation: Looking at things from a different point of view or perspective A child may like to view the world from different heights or positions.

Enclosure / containing: Placing object (or selves) in specific space A child may focus on putting things inside containers or being contained themselves.

Transformation: Changing substances

A child may be interested in changing states, for example mixing water with sand or looking through coloured lenses.

Trajectory: Planes of movement – how objects move or land A child may enjoy exploring forces and movement for example by dropping things, kicking, or throwing.

Positioning: Placing or ordering items

A child might line things up in a row, stack objects on top of each other, or sort toys by colour
