	Dizziness or fainting due to the heat or weight.	The time when the adult is wearing the full kit is limited to 5 minutes max. Adjustments are made in response to the room being hot – the window can open and there is a fan. The kit can be removed quickly.	
	Dropping equipment onto parts of their body.	The adult is assisted by the facilitator and advised during the dressing up process. The facilitator supervises and assists the removal of	

		the sword, dagger, armour and helmet. The dagger scabbard has a leather cover to prevent injury to the person if it is dropped.
