

Stephenson Steam Railway Hazard Identification

- This is **not** a risk assessment. As stated in the Department of Education's 'Safe Keeping' publication, "the group leader should carry out a risk assessment"
- In the case of an emergency please contact a member of staff
- North East Museums highly recommends that group leaders conduct preliminary visits
- Group leaders should take the behaviour and ability of their group into consideration when compiling a risk assessment
- It is the responsibility of the group leader to monitor the behaviour and safety of their group.

Hazard identification	Risk and to whom	Existing control measures set up by North East Museums	Further action to be taken by the school / group leader (add own comments)
Inside the Museum Large engines Uneven surfaces	All staff and visitors Falls and trips on uneven surface or steps, including bumping into large engines. Accidents from climbing on engines. Damage to clothes/skin from oil on train surfaces. Cold environment. Injuries from using wooden railway tracks	Uneven surfaces. Children and visitors advised to take care, to not run and to be aware of large engines and oil patches prior to entering the museum on led visits. Any physical access requirements are clarified when making a booking. Adults and children told not to climb on engines. Visitors advised to wear suitable clothing and footwear for museum conditions. Children and adults advised on how to safely put together railway tracks and where in the museum to try out their experiment.	Children to be supervised at all times Classes divided into small groups when moving around the museum. Notify museum staff of access requirements when making a booking. Children supervised at all times. Ensure children do not climb on engines. Appropriate clothing and footwear to be worn. Children supervised at all times.

Education Room Use of craft tools and materials Opening doors/windows	All staff and visitors. Cuts from craft tools e.g. scissors Fingers trapped in windows or doors.	All sharp and dangerous objects stored away from children and materials used under supervision. Children instructed how to use tools and materials safely. Locks on windows, children advised to take care opening doors.	Children to be supervised at all times Children to be supervised at all times.
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
